

President's Message



s we turn toward fall, I'm struck by how strongly our past and future continue to meet in the present moment for the Polish Falcons of America.

This summer, my wife, Patti, and I visited Poland twice. In June, we joined the World Sokol Federation Slet in Brodnica—hundreds of young athletes filling the town with energy and discipline across track and field, soccer, table tennis, floor hockey, and more. During the Slet, the Institute of National Remembrance (IPN) hosted a conference on the Sokol movement where I presented on the history of the Polish Falcons, and we formally submitted PFA's application to join the World Sokol Federation. IPN also opened a PFA historical exhibit at the Brodnica museum, where I had the privilege to speak. Seeing young people compete while our story was exhibited down the street was a vivid reminder: our heritage is living.

In August, I was honored to attend the inauguration of President Karol Nawrocki in Warsaw. The day began at the Sejm with an inspiring address, followed by a beautiful Mass held at St. John the Baptist Cathedral. After that, the day concluded with ceremonies in Piłsudski Square at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier with a reception under the Royal Castle. One line from the President's remarks captured his commitment as he assumes office: "As President of Poland, I will be the voice of the Polish people."

Between those milestones, we advanced an important piece of our own history. Last fall, I first visited Joan Iversen Goswell, granddaughter of Dr. T. A. Starzyński, to discuss her grandfather's memorabilia. She gave me artifacts, including Dr. Starzyński's medals, which I took to be preserved with the IPN archive in Poland in June. This May, Vice President Patricia Del Busse, Patti, and I returned, and Mrs. Goswell entrusted us with additional items which will be sent to IPN. Dr. Starzyński's leadership helped shape the Falcons; ensuring his legacy is properly safeguarded honors him and strengthens us.

As the season shifts, so does our focus at home: fall Nest activities, cultural programs, and the everyday work of building community. I'm also pleased to share that our new Physical Education Director, Elizabeth Schaefer, began her duties on September 1, succeeding our long-serving Chris Puskar. Please join me in welcoming Elizabeth and thanking Chris for her devoted service.

I invite you to take part—coach a youth team, bring a friend to a meeting, share your family's Falcon story, or consider donating historical materials that deserve to be preserved. The bridges we're building—with our youth, with partners in Poland, and with our own history—depend on each of us. Thank you for your continued commitment to the Polish Falcons.

2025 Falcon Family Award Information



The purpose of the Falcon Family Award is to recognize and honor a family who is instrumental in the success of their Nest or District. This can involve holding offices, organizing events, participating in any Falcon programs, and contributing to the Good of the Order through work.

There will be three categories for the Program:

- 1. A Nest with a building or property
- 2. A Nest that does not own a building or property
- 3. A District

Prizes are \$500 per category.

To be considered for the Award, a Nest or District must submit the names (two or more individuals) in a family and describe their service to their Nest and/or District in 2025.

Eligibility Requirements:

- 1. One family only (at least two individuals or more who are related).
- 2. Pictures of Members working the events for the Nest.
- **3**. Deadline is October 31, 2025 (include events that are planned for November and December).
- **4.** Activities within the calendar year, 2025, are the only activities to be considered.
- 5. If being nominated for both Nest and District activities, there should be two applications; one from the Nest and one from the District (do not combine activities).


ABOUT THE AUTHOR



Connecting Generations: Meeting the Granddaughter of Dr. T.A. Starzyński

An Unexpected Door To Our Past

Last fall, I had the privilege of visiting the home of Joan Iversen Goswell, the granddaughter of Dr. Teofil A. Starzyński; one of the most consequential figures in the history of the Polish Falcons. Dr. Starzynski served as President of PFA from 1912 to 1918, and from 1924 to 1952, when he passed away.

Joan lives about forty miles north of Pittsburgh, and at 86 years old, she remains as sharp, warm, and engaged as anyone I've met. She reached out to me with a simple, generous purpose: to find the right home for her grandfather's memorabilia so that it could be preserved for posterity and shared with future generations of Falcons.

A Conversation That Felt Like Family

We sat together for hours, talking about the Polish Falcons—our mission, our history, our enduring sense of community—and about her grandfather, her parents, and the family stories that connect the personal with the historic. These were not just recollections; they were living threads that tie our present to the people who built and sustained the organization we love.

As our conversation drew to a close, Joan made an extraordinary gesture. She entrusted me with many of her grandfather's belongings—most notably, the full set of medals Dr. Starzyński received over his lifetime. The weight of those medals wasn't only physical; it was symbolic. They represented a life of service, leadership, and faith in the ideals at the heart of the Falcons' movement. "I want these to be in the right hands," Joan told me, "so others can learn who he was and why it mattered."

From Pennsylvania To Poland

In June 2025, I returned to visit Joan again—this time with my wife, Patti, and our Vice President, Patricia Del Busse. We enjoyed another warm, wide-ranging conversation about Dr. Starzyński and the family legacy. Joan's generosity continued as she entrusted us with additional materials to ensure that

an even fuller record of her grandfather's life and impact could be preserved forever. The timing was providential. Later in June 2025, I traveled to Poland and personally delivered the medals and other items to Marzena Kruk, Director of the Archive at the Institute of National Remembrance (IPN) for inclusion in our Polish Falcons historical archive maintained there. That archive, which the Falcons have carefully developed in partnership with IPN, safeguards our collective memory—documents, artifacts, and stories that trace our path across generations.

Why Dr. Starzyński Still Matters

It is no exaggeration to say that Dr. T.A. Starzyński played a significant role in shaping the character and reach of the Polish Falcons in the twentieth century. A physician by training and a visionary by temperament, he championed the ideals of physical fitness, civic virtue, and service to both Polonia and the American nation. The momentum he gave our organization—its discipline, its sense of mission, and its pride—continues to influence our work today.

Connecting with his granddaughter vividly underscores why stewardship of our history is more than nostalgia. It is a responsibility. These artifacts—his medals, papers, and mementos—are not simply objects. They are evidence: proof of the service, leadership, and sacrifice that built our community. Preserving them in a trusted archive ensures that future members, scholars, and friends of the Falcons can see, study, and be inspired by the record of his life.





I'm deeply grateful to Joan Iversen Goswell for her trust and for the grace with which she has shared her family's legacy with all of us. Her decision ensures that Dr. Starzyński's story will be told with dignity, accuracy, and accessibility—now and in the decades to come. It also strengthens a living bond between our present leadership and the family of one of our most important forebears.

As our archive grows, so does our capacity to tell our story well—to show how the ideals of the Polish Falcons have taken root in real lives and real communities. Joan's generosity and the care with which these items are now preserved at IPN are a reminder that history is a relay. Each generation carries the baton and hands it to the next.

Polish Falcons at the World Sokol Federation Slet in Brodnica

Back in June, I attended the World Sokol Federation Slet in Brodnica, Poland, accompanied by my wife, Patti. During the Slet, I participated in the opening ceremonies and delivered a presentation on the history of the Polish Falcons at a conference on the Sokol movement hosted by the Institute of National Remembrance (IPN). While in Brodnica, I also submitted the Polish Falcons of America's formal application to join the World Sokol Federation—an important step toward deepening international cooperation and expanding opportunities for our youth.

A Living Tradition on the Field

The Slet brought together hundreds of young athletes competing in track and field, soccer, table tennis, floor hockey, and more. Participants came from numerous towns and cities in Poland, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, and Lithuania. Patti and I joined the opening ceremonies and marched from Brodnica's town square to the competition grounds—flags high, units in formation, families cheering. We also had some fun trying our skills at the hand grenade throwing competition. The atmosphere was electric, and it captured what Sokol has championed for more than 160 years: disciplined bodies, strong minds, and service to community.

We were delighted to see friends from the broader Sokol family, including Pittsburgh native—and good friend—Joe Bielicki, president of Sokol USA, whose presence underscored the strength of transatlantic ties within the movement.

Sharing the Polish Falcons' Story

At the IPN-hosted conference on the Sokol movement, I presented a slide deck on the history of the Polish Falcons of America—from our late-19th-century beginnings among Polish immigrants in Chicago, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, Detroit, and New York; through two world wars and economic upheavals; to 138 years of service to our members and the broader Polish diaspora. The discussion affirmed that our model—physical culture joined to civic responsibility and cultural pride—still resonates.

Our remarks also emphasized the international character of Sokol. For generations, Czechs, Poles, Slovaks, Serbs, and Americans have shared the conviction that strengthening the body fortifies the mind and the nation. Polish Falcons in the United States lived that conviction in tangible ways: it is estimated that more than 25,000 young men from our community volunteered for the Polish Army in France during World War I. Many were Falcons; among them, Lt. Lucjan Chałkowski of Nest 7 in Brooklynbelieved to be the first officer of that army to fall in combat—gave his life for a free Poland. Our history is not a footnote; it is a thread woven into the larger Sokol tapestry.

History on Display: PFA Exhibit

A highlight of the trip was the opening of the PFA historical exhibit created by IPN at the Brodnica Museum. I had the honor of speaking at the opening and expressing our gratitude for IPN's stewardship of our materials since we entrusted the Institute with our entire historical archive six years ago. Their archivists treated our photos, documents, artifacts, and personal testimonies not as relics, but as living evidence of a global Polish experience.

We offered special thanks to Marzena Kruk, Director of the IPN Archive, whose dedication has safeguarded our collection, and to Grzegorz Trzyna for outstanding exhibit design. We also expressed deep gratitude to IPN President Karol Nawrocki for his unwavering support—and extended warm congratulations on his recent election as President of Poland. Pan Prezydencie, serdeczne gratulacje!

The exhibit's message is timely. In an age of short attention spans and fragile truths, preserving and sharing primary sources—uniforms worn in 1918, letters from Falcon soldiers, photographs of historic moments, insurance ledgers that financed community halls—gives our movement credibility and continuity. It reminds our younger members that they inherit more than a sport: they inherit a legacy of civic leadership, patriotism, and mutual aid.

Faith and Community

Our visit coincided with the feast of Corpus Christi, a deeply significant holy day in Poland. Patti and I attended Mass and joined the traditional procession through town.

That public expression of faith—solemn, communal, and orderly—echoed the same values we saw on the Slet fields: shared purpose, discipline, and reverence for what binds us together.

Looking Ahead

Brodnica confirmed that the Sokol spirit thrives—in the disciplined effort of young athletes, in the careful work of historians and archivists, and in the friendships that span continents. As we await the outcome of PFA's application to the World Sokol Federation, we'll continue building bridges, supporting our youth, and telling the Falcons' story wherever it can inspire.

To our partners at IPN: thank you for making history come alive. To our friends in Sokol organizations: Czuwaj!—be vigilant in strengthening our bodies and safeguarding our shared memory. And to all who cheered, marched, competed, and volunteered: you reminded us that our heritage is not just remembered—it is lived. Czołem!



A DAY OF HISTORY & HONOR IN WARSAW

On August 6, I attended the inauguration of Poland's new President, Karol Nawrocki, in Warsaw with my wife, Patti. I had the privilege of representing Polish Falcons of America and it was a profound honor—for me personally and for our organization—to be present for a day that blended state ceremony, faith, history, and civic pride.

OATH & ADDRESS AT THE SEIM

The morning began in the Sejm, where a joint session of the Sejm and Senate (the National Assembly) convened for the swearing-in. After taking the constitutional oath, President Nawrocki delivered a forceful address that set out themes of national sovereignty, rule of law, and security. "The free choice of a free nation has brought me before you today...As a Christian, I forgive ... what was happening during the elections," he said, striking a conciliatory note amid sharp political debate. He pledged dependability in office: "For five years, every hour, every day, every week, with every decision and every legislative initiative, I will fulfill my commitments." He also stressed defense and alliance priorities: "I will strive to make the Polish army the largest NATO force in the European Union."

Underscoring his stance on Europe, the President added that he would "be the voice of those who want a sovereign Poland...in the European Union... but... Poland will remain Poland," and that he would "never agree to the European Union taking away Poland's competences" not provided for in the treaties.

ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST ARCHCATHEDRAL

At noon, we joined a beautiful Mass at St. John the Baptist Cathedral, offered for the Homeland and the new President. The liturgy was celebrated by Archbishop Wojciech Polak, Primate of Poland, and the homily was delivered by Archbishop Adrian Józef Galbas, S.A.C., Metropolitan Archbishop of Warsaw.

ROYAL CASTLE RECEPTION

In the afternoon, the ceremonies moved to the Royal Castle for a formal reception and the investiture connected with Poland's highest state orders—an elegant reminder of the continuity of Poland's civic traditions.

PIŁSUDSKI SQUARE & THE TOMB OF THE UNKNOWN SOLDIER

Later in Piłsudski Square, at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the President assumed command of the Armed Forces during an impressive military ceremony. The pageantry and setting offered a moving tribute to service and sacrifice in the cause of a free Poland.

STRENGTHENING TIES WITH IPN

While in Warsaw, we also met with Marzena Kruk, Director of the Archives of the Institute of National Remembrance (IPN), to continue our ongoing cooperation. Director Kruk kindly invited us to the opening of a new IPN exhibit at the Museum of the Cursed Soldiers and Political Prisoners of the Polish People's Republic—the memorial museum at the former Mokotów Prison, a place of profound remembrance. IPN has been mounting exhibitions there, deepening public understanding of Poland's 20th-century Communist-era trials; it was an amazing honor to be included.





The exhibition is titled "Murdered City. Reliefs of Maria Hiszpanska-Neumann." The exhibition also features two of her other works related to Warsaw, a city the Germans wanted to murder (the cover of the first edition of Władysław Szpilman's memoirs—the story featured in the film The Pianist—titled "Death of a City" and the woodcut "Burnt City"). The exhibition, dedicated to Warsaw—a city unimaginably affected by the barbarity of World War II—centers on the reliefs of Maria of Spain-Neumann from the series "Murdered City," created at the turn of 1964/65, held at the Archives of the Institute of National Remembrance. The reliefs are a symbolic, artistic tribute to the graphic artist's hometown of Warsaw, and to her friends who perished during the Warsaw Uprising. The exhibition will also feature works by Maria Hiszpańska-Neumann from the collections of the Zacheta National Gallery of Art and the Warsaw Public Library.

The objects presented in the exhibition are complemented by photographs from the Institute's collection, taken by Henryk Śmigacz and Antoni Snawadzki, showing the gradual but systematic destruction of Warsaw. The exhibition will document both the destruction of the capital during the siege in 1939 and the destruction resulting from the insurgent fighting and the barbaric destruction of the city by the Germans in 1944.

REFLECTIONS

For the Polish Falcons, the day's ceremonies were a powerful reminder that public life draws strength from memory, community, and service. Being present—in the Sejm, in the Cathedral, in the halls of the Royal Castle, and at Piłsudski Square—was both moving and meaningful. We were grateful to witness a new chapter in Poland's civic story and to represent our members at such a historic moment.

PFA FINANCIAL SUMMARY OF 2024

Commentary on 2-Year Financial Statements

At Polish Falcons of America (PFA), we are committed to continually improving your experience. Our dedicated team works hard to adapt to your changing needs, ensuring you have access to the products, technology, benefits, and services that best support your goals.

We take pride in offering our Members the kind of personal, attentive service that larger commercial insurers simply cannot match—building relationships and providing support tailored to you.

We deeply value the trust you place in us. On behalf of the PFA Board of Directors and leadership team, thank you for your ongoing membership and support. This report provides an analysis of PFA's comparable financial performance for 2024 vs. 2023.

Key Insights:

1) Asset & Liability Reduction on Balance Sheet: The 27% reduction in assets and corresponding 26% decrease in liabilities stemmed from an amendment to the legacy annuity reinsurance treaty, effective December 31, 2024. Under the revised terms, all annuities sold between October 1, 2019, and June 30, 2024, are now reinsured by Heritage Life Insurance Company (HLIC)—a multi-billion-dollar insurer rated A- by Kroll Bond Rating Agency. This rating reflects HLIC's strong capital position and disciplined risk management. The arrangement strengthens member fund protection by transferring risk to a well-capitalized, highly rated institution. To execute the transaction, assets were sold and transferred during the fourth quarter of 2024.

2) Notable Revenue & Expense Variances from Year to Year:

- i. Premiums: Premiums, net of reinsurance, were up 33% vs. 2023 mainly driven by life premiums significantly increasing due to the new distribution and process improvement PFA embarked on in late 2023 and 2024.
- ii. Reinsurance Expense Allowance: PFA receives an expense allowance from its reinsurance partners for the administration of each reinsured policy. In 2024, the significant volume of new certificates drove a substantial increase in this line item. These allowances are provided by HLIC and Swiss Re. In addition to the previously noted strength of HLIC, Swiss Re is one of the world's largest reinsurers and holds an A+ rating from AM Best—further enhancing member protection through the backing of one of the industry's most reputable institutions.
- iii. Claims: Claims increased 74% year-over-year, driven primarily by higher annuity claim activity. This was largely the result of a small number of large accounts paid out in 2024. These annuities were out-of-surrender and are fully reserved on a dollar-for-dollar basis; therefore, while the payouts were sizable, the overall financial impact was minimal.
- iv. General Expenses & Commissions: With higher premium volume comes higher first-year expenses, often referred to as "first-year strain." The substantial increase in commissions in 2024 was a direct result of the significant premium growth. However, this impact is partially offset by the previously noted expense allowances received from reinsurance partners.

- v. Other expenses: The sharp decline in other expenses reflects the termination of PFA's Employer-Sponsored Pension Plan in the fourth quarter of 2023. The related costs of this termination were recognized in this line item during 2023.
- **3) Investment Strategy:** PFA remains committed to investing in high-quality, high-yield assets to support member certificates. As of December 31, 2024, the portfolio consisted entirely of investment-grade bonds and CM1 mortgage participations.
- **4) Cash Flow Management:** PFA remains cash flow positive and is actively deploying funds in 2025. In collaboration with investment advisors and actuaries, management strategically aligns investment cash flows with liabilities to ensure proper matching and avoid timing mismatches.
- 5) Fraternal Engagement: Fraternal events and member engagement remain a cornerstone and key differentiator for PFA. These activities foster the strong sense of community and belonging that defines our organization. This year, we extend heartfelt congratulations to Christine Puskar as she concludes her distinguished career as Physical Education Director. Chrissy's dedication, warmth, and genuine care for every child—treating them as her own—have left a lasting impact on countless members who grew up with the Falcons. She has been an integral part of the PFA family and its traditions. In 2025, we are excited to welcome Beth Schaefer, who will carry forward and build upon Chrissy's remarkable legacy.
- **6) Technological Adaptation:** Embracing technological advancements, PFA continues to refine processes to provide an optimal member experience while ensuring robust data protection in a dynamic risk environment.
- 7) **Small but Strong:** The chart at the bottom right is an analysis performed by Standard Analytical based on PFA's December 31, 2024 financial position.

Conclusion:

Despite facing challenges, PFA continues to strengthen its foundation for long-term success. By leveraging its distribution network to drive new business, embracing innovations in the member experience, and adapting to an ever-changing environment, PFA has demonstrated both resilience and vision. Since 1928, the organization has remained steadfast in its mission to provide essential financial and fraternal services that safeguard the well-being of members and their communities. Having navigated the Great Depression, two World Wars, and multiple recessions, PFA continues to deliver high-quality products and services backed by strong, well-managed assets.

Member well-being—both physical and mental—remains central to PFA's purpose. The organization also emphasizes the importance of financial preparedness for extraordinary events. Through a combination of sports programs, community activities, and its core financial offerings, PFA addresses these needs in all circumstances, just as it has for nearly a century.

IN MEMORY OF ROBERT STRYBEL

Robert Strybel, Polonia's longstanding Warsaw correspondent and contributor to the Sokół Polski, passed away on August 10, 2025, in Warsaw, Poland. For decades, he had kept fellow PolAms informed of current events in Poland while generating interest in all facets of its cultural heritage.

Born in 1941 in what was then Detroit's predominantly Polish enclave suburb of Hamtramck, Mich., Strybel spent a good deal of his childhood with his Polishborn grandparents, learning the language and traditions of his ancestors. He studied journalism and foreign languages (Polish, German, French, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, and Spanish) and got his master's degree in Polish studies from the University of Wisconsin. His first teaching job was as a Polish language instructor and history lecturer at St. Mary's College and Saints Cyril and Methodius Seminary at Orchard Lake near Detroit. Afterwords, he taught Polish-related subjects at the college, high school, and adult-education levels. Thanks to New York's Kościuszko Foundation, Strybel received a scholarship to pursue doctoral studies in Polish Philology at Warsaw University. There he met his future wife, Maria "Majka" née Derkacz, who was majoring in Polish. Rob often quipped, "Instead of me getting a PhD, a pretty Warsaw coed got an 'MRS.' degree."

As Polonia's first accredited native Polish-American correspondent in Warsaw, in the early 1970s, Strybel began providing the PolAm press with regular reports on Polish current events, which appeared in numerous different publications. For over three decades, Strybel also worked as a journalist and translator at the Warsaw Bureau of the Reuters News Agency. Poland's longest-serving American correspondent, he had reported on every major Polish development, including the violent 1970 food-price riots, the rise and fall of Solidarity (1980-1981), successive papal visits, and the collapse of Communism (1989) as well as Poland's admission to NATO (1999) and the European Union (2004). Later on, he provided detailed coverage of Poland's unprecedented solidarity with the embattled Ukrainian nation invaded by Russia in 2022.

When asked about his mission in life, Strybel had often said it was "to get fellow Polish Americans hooked on their heritage." He did this by generating interest and pride in Poland's history, culture, and traditions. He also promoted family research and visited the Old Country. In the late 1980s, Rob and Majka teamed up to write "Polish Heritage Cookery; said to be the largest Polish cookbook ever published in the English language.

Like his father, the Strybels' only son, Lesław (born 1972), was raised bilingually and biculturally. He received his Master's degree in American Studies (Cultural anthropology) from Warsaw University, under a cooperative arrangement with Indiana University. He has worked as an English teacher and musician for many years.

Strybel was predeceased by both his parents, Edward Strybel (1965) and Angeline Strybel née Kupczyńska (2004), as well as by his beloved wife of 52 years, Majka (2022).

These prized collections are then brought home to be cooked, pickled, or dried, ensuring they last through the cold Polish winter months.

Mushroom & Onion Pierogi

perfect warm or cold and great for dipping in soup

Mushroom Filling:

- 1 lb fresh mushrooms (chopped)
- ½ cup onion (minced)
- 2 tbsp butter
- ¼ cup breadcrumbs
- Salt and pepper (to taste)

Directions:

- 1. In a saucepan, sauté the chopped mushrooms and minced onions in butter over medium heat until the mushrooms release their moisture, about 4-6 minutes.
- **2.** Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 3. Stir in the breadcrumbs and mix well.
- 4. Remove from heat and let cool.

Pastry:

- 1 can refrigerated biscuit dough (8-count tube)
- Beaten egg wash (optional)

Directions:

- 1. Open the biscuit dough and separate into individual pieces. Flatten each into a round shape.
- 2. Fill each round with the mushroom filling and seal or crimp with a fork.
- **3.** Arrange the pierogi on a greased or parchment covered baking sheet.
- **4.** Brush with beaten egg if desired.
- **5.** Bake in a preheated 350°F oven for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown.


